Year 8 Parents' Evening 19 June 2014

- 98% of parents feel their daughter is making good progress
- 98% of parents said that teachers expect their daughter to work hard and to do her best
- 93% of parents said that their daughter has homework set regularly
- 94% of parents felt teachers encourage my daughter to become mature and independent.

What can we do to improve?

To ensure that as far as possible homework is set according to the homework timetable.

Year 7 Parents' Evening 15 May 2014

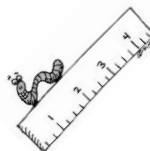
NUMERACY CORNER

Measurement Metric/Imperial Conversions

In real life we still use a combination of Imperial (old fashioned) and Metric (modern) units of measure. This is reflected in the GCSE exams where students are expected to know the following rough conversions.

Weight

1 kilogram is approximately 2.2 pound (lb)



Length

1 inch is approximately 2.5 centimetres

1 foot is approximately 30 centimetres

5 miles are approximately 8 Kilometres

Capacity

1 litre is approximately 1 ¾ pints

1 gallon is approximately 4.5 litres

INCLUSION QUALITY MARK FLAGSHIP SCHOOL



In March 2013, Sir Jonathan North Community College was the first school in Leicester to achieve the prestigious Inclusion Quality Mark Flagship award. This is awarded to a school which demonstrates excellence in provision for all children regardless of individual need, ability or disability and the commitment to continuous improvement in this area.

Following a review on 22 May 2014, the assessor, Ms Selina Westwood, found that the College's policies, procedures and staff continued to meet the high standards demanded for flagship school status.

The IQM scheme recognises inclusive excellence where the teaching and learning, achievements, attitudes and well-being of every student is upheld. The assessor wrote:

'Sir Jonathan North Community College radiates a high commitment and reflective capacity to continue to develop its inclusive practice. The impact of the strong leadership demonstrated by the Principal, her senior team and the governors results in school-wide actions to provide a socially cohesive learning environment for all associated with the College. The underpinning ethos and centrality of inclusion for driving the success of every individual student extends to its supportive work with primary and post-16 partners. Parents welcome the approach. Governors are fully supportive.

The broad group of staff responsible for driving the inclusion agenda are effective, self-critical and open to new approaches. Together they provide a sustainable base for research and development. They welcome opportunities to disseminate and share in others' good practice. There is a quiet passion to keep on improving by involving and taking others on the journey and valuing everyone's contribution.

Throughout the visit it was clear there was a widespread pride in being a part of Sir Jonathan North Community College. Students valued the role they played in the growth and development of excellence. Diversity and difference are genuinely valued and celebrated. "We are a real community; the way we work and talk together across the year groups.... we value that". "You learn so much here from the cultural side of life". "Our school provides so many different opportunities such as our current Young Enterprise success and the chance to be the next "Mr Men series" by designing and selling our "I Wish" book to inspire children's career aspirations". "There is so much support here; staff give up their time and it's a welcoming support whether you are in Y7 and settling in or trying to get the best grades possible in Y10/11".

Sir Jonathan North Community College works supportively with a range of other educational partners and to share its best practice. It remains open to reviewing its own inclusive practice and makes changes to benefit the school and its community.'

MOVING TOGETHER ARTS AWARD DANCE SHOWCASE

On Wednesday 18 June, students in Year 7-11 (*Molly Cleere, Hannah Fossard- Jones, Pippa Chappell, Ava Jowsey, Jaime Sweeney, Alicia Smith, Rosa Burston, Bethan John, Megan John, Jordan Smith, Anastacia Moroz and Josie Stephens*) performed in the **Moving Together Arts Award Dance Showcase** at the Phoenix. Nine students have now successfully achieved the Silver Arts Award, worth a GCSE Grade A-C and three students have achieved a Gold Award which is equivalent to half an A- Level!

The girls were selected for this unique opportunity to engage with the Arts Award to develop their dance knowledge and understanding through both practical and theory workshops. They were given the opportunity to work with professional dancers and had lessons at De Montfort University. The programme gave them the experience of different styles of dance and they had the chance to go the theatre to watch a variety of shows.
